Key dates for 2025 Legislative Session (link)

January 8	Session opens.
January 15	Deadline for Governor to introduce budget bills.
January 17	Deadline to request a bill to guarantee a committee hearing.
February 3	Senate bill introduction deadline. Senate Rules Committee may consider late bills.
February 5	Governor delivers State of the State address.
February 7	House bill introduction deadline. House Rules Committee may consider late bills.
February 11	Bike Maryland Symposium in Annapolis.
March 17	Crossover Day – A bill must pass out of one chamber to guarantee a hearing in the other chamber.
March 31	Deadline to pass budget out of both chambers.
April 7	General Assembly adjourns at midnight (aka "Sine Die").

Bike Maryland Priority Bills for 2025

- Bikes on Sidewalks
- Bicycle Safety Yield
- Transportation and Climate Alignment Act
- Vulnerable Road User Enhanced Safety Bill





Bikes on Sidewalks - HB0375/SB0392

- Sponsored in 2025 by Delegate Dana Jones and Senator Jeff Waldstreicher
- Makes legally riding bikes on sidewalks the default in all of Maryland
- Currently, biking is allowed on sidewalks only if the local county/city passes a law legalizing biking on sidewalks
- Seeks to avoid disproportionate policing impacts for people of color riding safely on sidewalks
- In 2024 HB0111 passed the House 134-2. The Senate Judicial Proceedings Committee did not vote on the bill.
- Senate (JPR) hearing January 31
- House (ENT) hearing February 6





Bicycle Safety Yield - HB0007

- Sponsored in 2024 by Senator Will Smith and Delegates Regina Boyce and Vaughan Stewart
- Allows bikes to treat stop signs as yield signs
- Makes biking through intersections safer by making cyclists more visible to cars
- 11 other States and DC now have such laws
- The law would follow guidance by the National Highway
 Traffic Administration endorsing such current state laws
 adopting this policy
- In 2024 HB0511 passed the House 119-13. The Senate Judicial Proceedings Committee did not vote on the bill.
- House (ENT) hearing January 30





Transportation and Climate Alignment HB0084/SB0395

- Sponsored in 2025 by Delegate Mark Edelson and Senator Shelley Hettleman
- Would require MDOT and regional planning agencies to measure and mitigate any increases in climate pollution and Vehicle Miles Travelled (VMT) caused by planned highway expansion projects costing over \$10m.
- Mitigation actions could include expanding access to mass transit, building protected bike infrastructure, expanding remote work options or locating jobs and amenities near residential housing.
- In 2024 HB0836 passed the House 101-37. The bill passed out of the Senate Finance Committee, passed a 2nd reading in the Senate, but did not receive a 3rd reading vote before the end of session.





Vulnerable Road User Enhanced Safety - HB 234/SB 385

- Patterned on Sarah Debbink Langenkamp bill that passed last year
- Also similar to laws relating to crashes in crosswalks and involving highway workers
- Would allow for adding up to two months incarceration if car driver injures/kills a vulnerable road user in any road context





Other Bills of Interest



- No Stopping, Standing or Parking in a Bike Lane HB 178/SB 133
 - Sponsored by Del Guyton and Sen Muse
 - Hearing Senate (JPR) January 22, House (ENT) January 30
- Bicyclist Safety Start HB 422
 - Sponsored by Del Palakovitch Carr
 - Allows bicyclists to begin moving where there is a leading pedestrian interval
 - Hearing House (ENT) February 6
- Graduated Speed Camera Fines HB 182/SB 113
 - Sponsored by Del. Stewart and Sen. Waldstreicher
 - Fines increase as the amount over the speed limit increases
 - Supported by MDOT
 - These flexible fines already in place for workzone infractions
- Contributory Negligence Carve Out HB 594
 - Sponsored by Delegates Embry, Boyce, Feldmark, Kaufman, Lewis, Palakovitch Carr etc..

We Oppose

EBike Registration, Titling and Insurance Mandates - SB 14

- Requirements treat Ebikes like automobiles
- Would be a significant disincentive to ebike ownership
- Anything that makes it harder to own a bike reduces number of bikes on the road and thus makes it less safe to ride
- Senate (JPR) hearing held January 22



Some Advocacy Basics for in-person meetings

- Build relationships with your 3 delegates and senator.
- Speak from personal experience and be authentic! Paint a picture that your electeds can remember... and maybe re-use in their own speeches, etc
- Take notes at meetings, and photos. Politicians love selfies. Post to your socials and tag them.
- After you talk: follow up with a friendly thank you.
- If a bill passes, be sure to follow up again.
- After session is over, circle back on the bills again if you can



Should you testify? Or send in written testimony?

- On the state level, testifying can be... A PROCESS
- Sending in testimony is subject to some rather arcane rules and procedures
- Although sometimes helpful, personal persuasion and relationship building is often more effective with state-level bills
- Testimony should be short, and feature why the bill is good for the state and its citizens
- Conversations with your delegates and senator should highlight why bikes/safer roads are good for your district.
